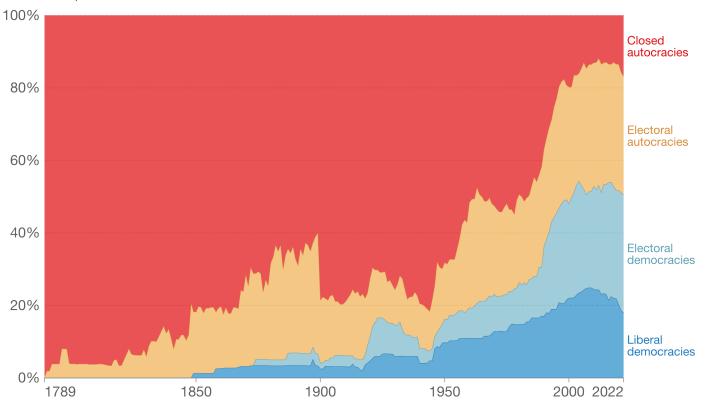

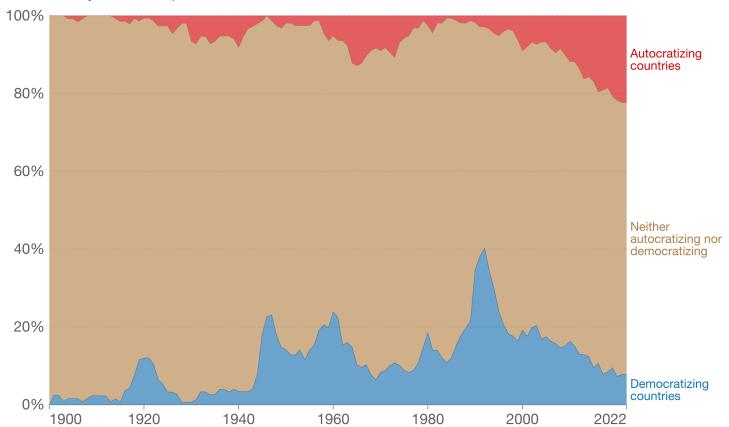

Political regimes based on the criteria of the classification by Episodes of Regime Transformation and the assessment by V-Dem¹ 's experts.

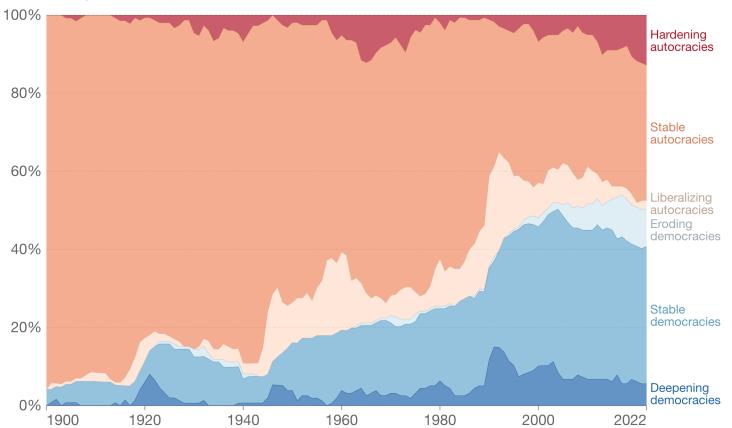

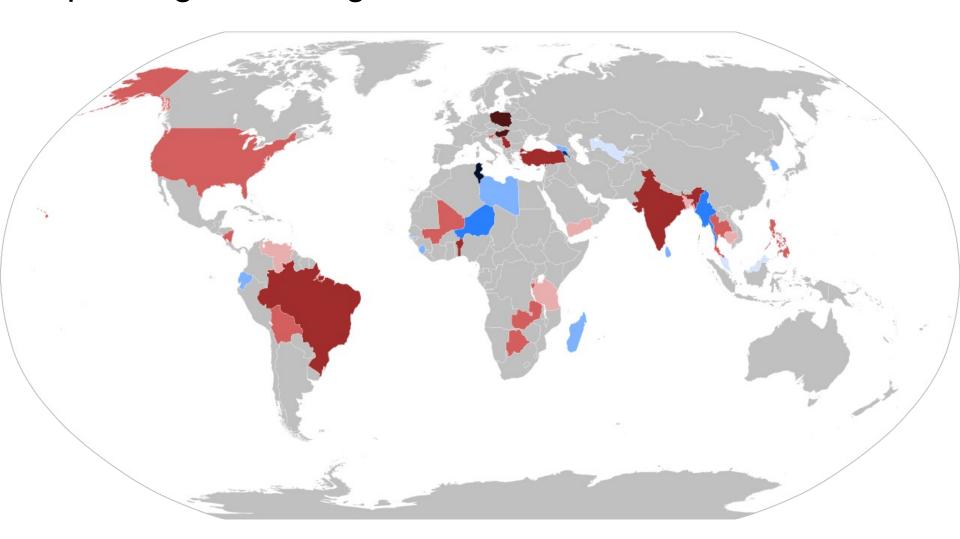

Map of regime change from 2010-2020

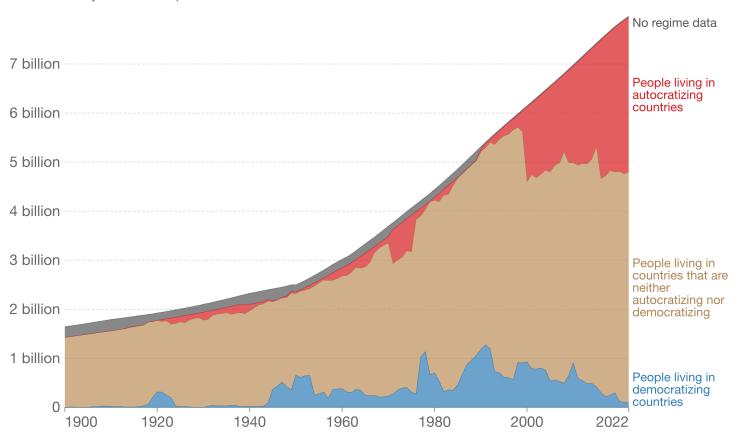

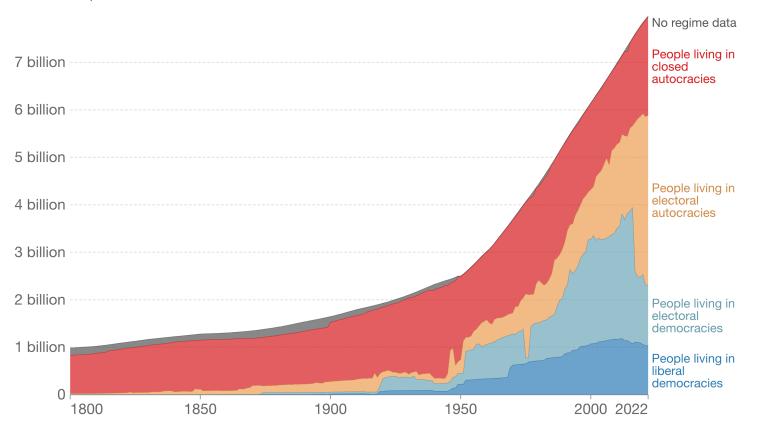


Most people live in autocracies

Defining Democratic Erosion / Backsliding / Decline

Our definition of democracy

Modern political democracy: institutional arrangement for arriving at political decisions in which individuals acquire the power to decide by means of a competitive struggle for the people's vote (Schumpeter 1942)

a system of governance in which rulers are held accountable for their actions in the public realm by citizens, acting indirectly through the competition and cooperation of their elected representatives (Schmitter and Karl 1991)

Core Elements of Democracy are:

Accountability, Participation, Contestation

Our definition of autocracy

Modern political autocracy: institutional arrangement in which individuals and groups in society are subject to the hierarchical authority of the state without opportunity for free participation

a system of governance in which rulers are **NOT** held accountable for their actions in the public realm by citizens

Core Elements of Autocracies are:

Hierarchy, Selectorate

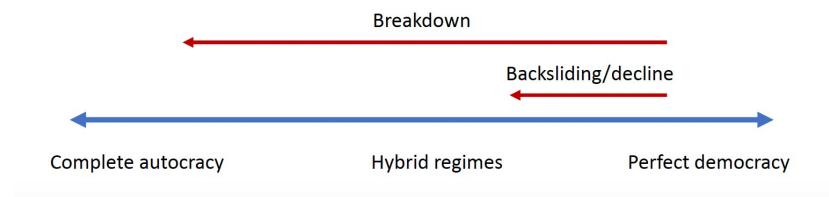
Democratic backsliding: state-led debilitation or elimination of any of the political institutions that sustain a democracy

- Changes that negatively affect competitive accountability, participation, and contestation
- Examine changes in institutions and procedures
- There are a variety of policies and political outcomes that might have anti-democratic overtones but that should not be considered democratic backsliding.

Democratic backsliding vs. breakdown

Democratic backsliding: state-led debilitation or elimination of any of the political institutions that sustain a democracy

Democratic breakdown: reversion from democracy to authoritarianism; extreme case of democratic decline

How the Techniques of Democratic Erosion have changed over time

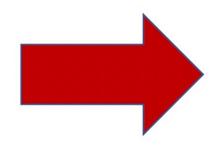
"Some of the most blatant forms of backsliding are now *less common*; and more vexing forms of backsliding are becoming *more common*.

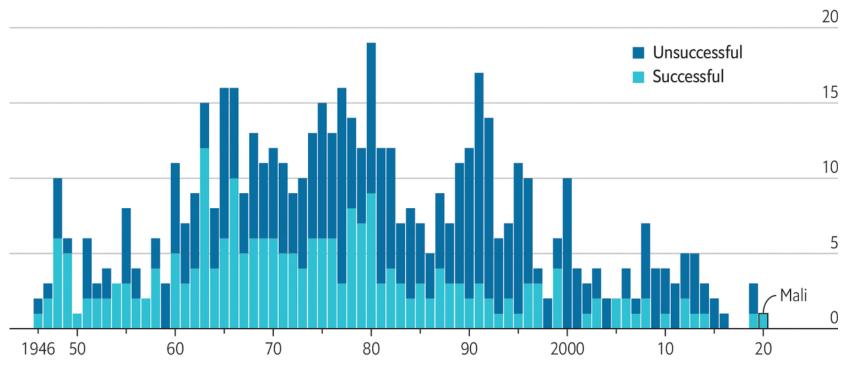


Promissory coups: Coup framed as a defense of democracy

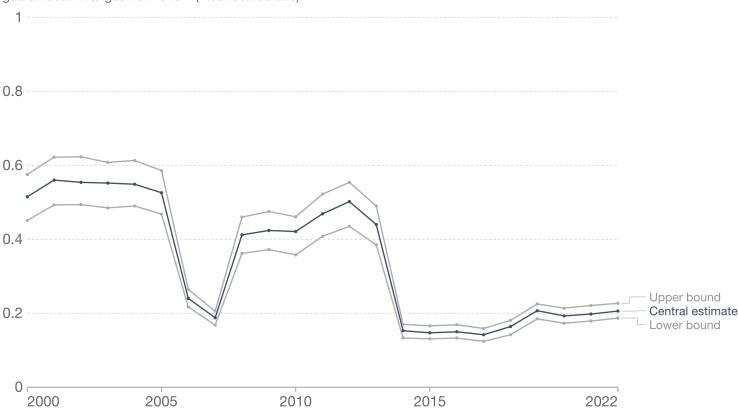

When Will Sudan's Promissory Coup End? Interview with Ruling General Provides Little Clarity for the Country's Future

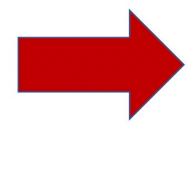

In the past three years, Sudan has experienced two promissory coups, plunging the country into ongoing political turmoil. Although outwardly intended to foster democratization, these coups often lead to a prolonged period of transitional or autocratic rule, ultimately failing to substantially increase the quality of the country's democratic institutions. Looking at recent comments by Sudan's top ruling general, it is unclear how much longer citizens will have to wait to vote and the future of the country's political leadership.

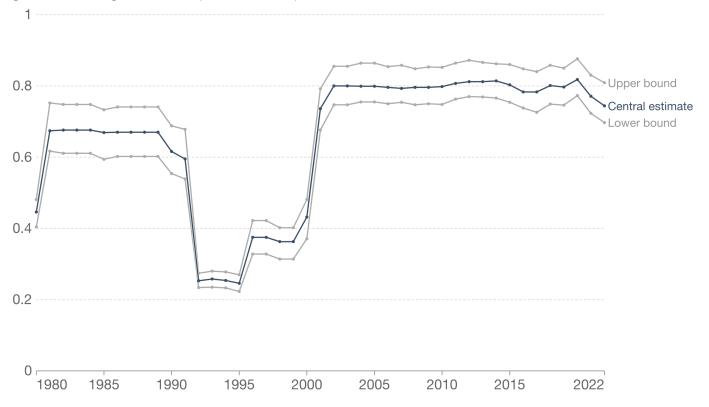

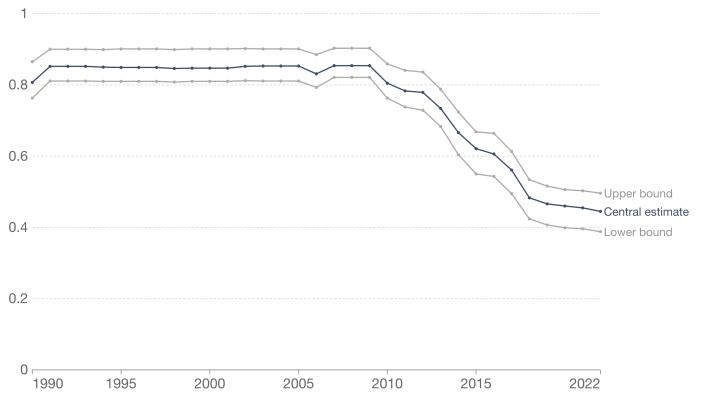


Executive Aggrandizement under Orbán, Hungary 2012

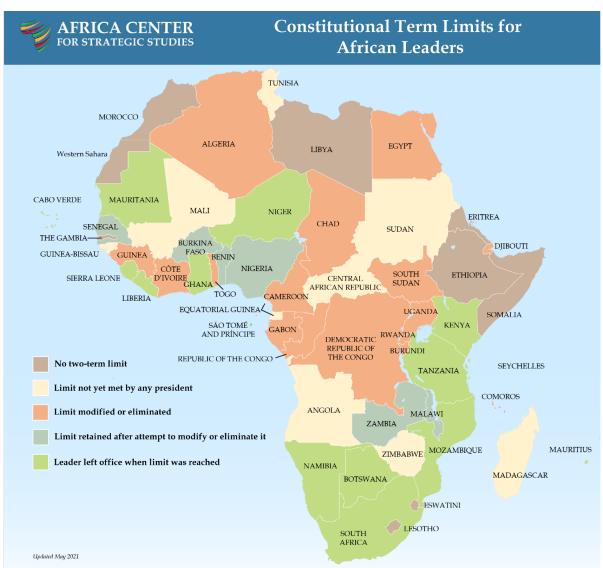
Electoral democracy index, Hungary, 1990 to 2022

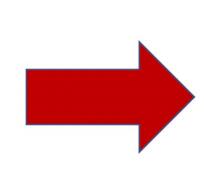

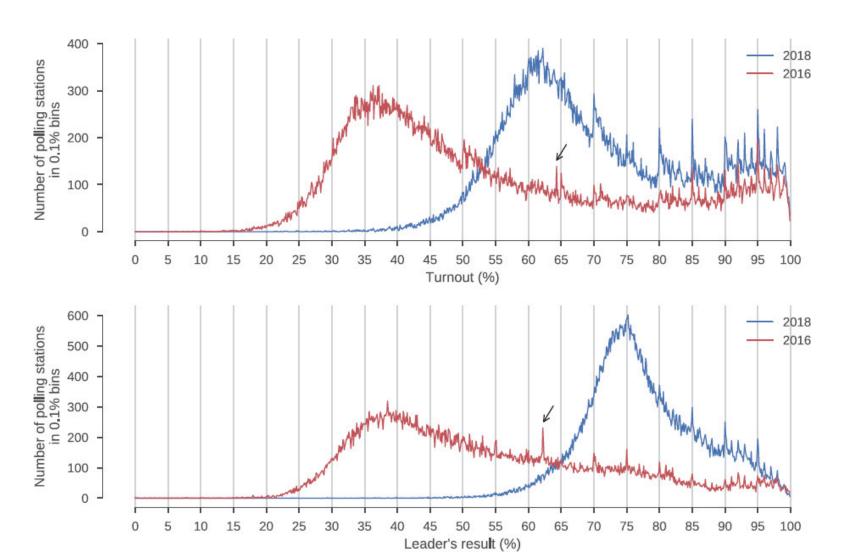

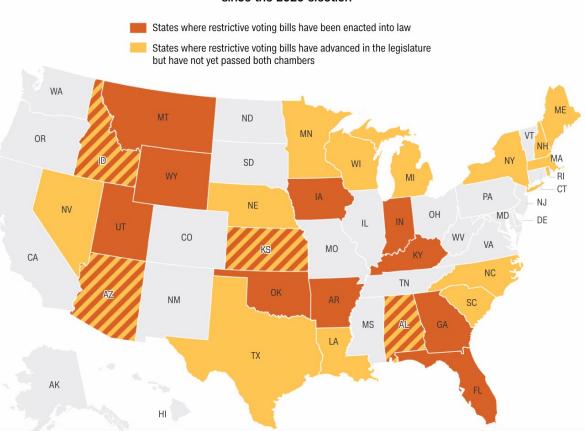


Strategic Election Manipulation in the US

Fourteen states have enacted 22 new laws making it harder to vote

In addition to the 22 new laws, an additional 61 bills were advancing through legislatures in 18 states. Advancing bills include those that have either passed in at least one chamber or have otherwise made progress at the committee level.

Strategic Election Manipulation in the US

Bills aiming to curb voting rights introduced in almost every state

State lawmakers have introduced at least 389 bills in 48 states that would make it harder for their residents to vote in upcoming elections. The state legislatures with the highest number of restrictive bills were Texas, Georgia and Arizona.
